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The Great Controversy, pt. 39: The Time of Trouble Evangelicals: Billy Graham Dead, Expect Greatest Revival. Superhero & Wakanda Fever. Black Panther & Pope's Docu-Series.

1. What is the title of chapter 39 of The Great Controversy?	

- 2. Let us read and meditate upon Daniel 12:1. This scripture brings to view the Time of Trouble.
- 3. Who is Michael? Revelation 12:7-9; Jude 1:9; 1 Thessalonians 4:16; John 5:25-29___
- **4.** What does Michael standing up means? Answer: It means the close of Jesus' intercession and the end of salvation, the close of human probation. Read the following. Hebrews 1:3; Romans 8:34; Acts 7:54-60.
- 5. What did the apostles and Stephen receive before Jesus was seen standing at the right of God? Acts 2:1-4; Acts 6:15

6. What message must go forth before the call to salvation ceases? Revelation 14:9,10,14-16

7. This also means that God's people must be sealed during the time of the proclamation of the third angel's message and before Jesus stands up. Read Revelation 7:1-4.

Now, while our great High Priest is making the atonement for us, we should seek to become perfect in Christ. Not even by a thought could our Saviour be brought to yield to the power of temptation. Satan finds in human hearts some point where he can gain a foothold; some sinful desire is cherished, by means of which his temptations assert their power. But Christ declared of Himself: "The prince of this world cometh, and hath nothing in Me." John 14:30. Satan could find nothing in the Son of God that would enable him to gain the victory. He had kept His Father's commandments, and there was no sin in Him that Satan could use to his advantage. This is the condition in which those must be found who shall stand in the time of trouble. {GC 623.1}

8. What words will Jesus utter when He stands up, similar to the words He uttered on the cross when that phase of His ministry to save us was completed? John 19:30; Revelation 16:17; Revelation 22:11______

When the third angel's message closes, mercy no longer pleads for the guilty inhabitants of the earth. The people of God have accomplished their work. They have received "the latter rain," "the refreshing from the presence of the Lord," and they are prepared for the trying hour before them. Angels are hastening to and fro in heaven. An angel returning from the earth announces that his work is done; the final test has been brought upon the world, and all who have proved themselves loyal to the divine precepts have received "the seal of the living God." Then Jesus ceases His intercession in the sanctuary above. He lifts His hands and with a loud voice says, "It is done;" and all the angelic host lay off their crowns as He makes the solemn announcement: "He that is unjust, let him be unjust still: and he which is filthy, let him be filthy still: and he that is righteous, let him be righteous still: and he that is holy, let him be holy still." Revelation 22:11. Every case has been decided for life or death. Christ has made the atonement for His people and blotted out their sins. The number of His subjects is made up; "the kingdom and dominion, and the greatness of the kingdom under the whole heaven," is about to be given to the heirs of salvation, and Jesus is to reign as King of kings and Lord of lords. {GC 613.2}

9. During this time of trouble, the sins of the repentant and the sealed people of God will be blotted out. See Daniel 12:1;Leviticus 16:20-23. Had not Jacob previously repented of his sin in obtaining the birthright by fraud, God would not have heard his prayer and mercifully preserved his life. So, in the time of trouble, if the people of God had unconfessed sins to appear before them while tortured with fear and anguish, they would be overwhelmed; despair would cut off their faith, and they could not have confidence to plead with God for deliverance. But while they have a deep sense of their unworthiness, they have no concealed wrongs to reveal. Their sins have gone beforehand to judgment and have been blotted out, and they cannot bring them to remembrance. {GC 620.1}

10. What is expected of the righteous once Jesus ceases His work of intercession? Isaiah 59:16; Daniel 12:1_

When He leaves the sanctuary, darkness covers the inhabitants of the earth. In that fearful time the righteous must live in the sight of a holy God without an intercessor. The restraint which has been upon the wicked is removed, and Satan has entire control of the finally impenitent. God's long-suffering has ended. The world has rejected His mercy, despised His love, and trampled upon His law. The wicked have passed the boundary of their probation; the Spirit of God, persistently resisted, has been at last withdrawn. Unsheltered by divine grace, they have no protection from the wicked one. Satan will then plunge the inhabitants of the earth into one great, final trouble.. {GC 614.1}

11. What will be let loosed during the time of trouble, since the call of salvation will be ended and God's faithful people would be sealed? Revelation 7:1-4

As the angels of God cease to hold in check the fierce winds of human passion, all the elements of strife will be let loose. The whole world will be involved in ruin more terrible than that which came upon Jerusalem of old. {GC 614.1}

12. What will fall upon unrepentant sinners during the time of trouble? Revelation 16:1,2

These plagues are not universal, or the inhabitants of the earth would be wholly cut off. Yet they will be the most awful scourges that have ever been known to mortals. All the judgments upon men, prior to the close of probation, have been mingled with mercy. The pleading blood of Christ has shielded the sinner from receiving the full measure of his guilt; but in the final judgment, wrath is poured out unmixed with mercy. {GC 628.2}

13. What does the Bible call this action of God? Isaiah 28:21; Joshua 10-10-12; Revelation 16:17,21
14. Who will the unrepentant blame for their sufferings?
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Those who honor the law of God have been accused of bringing judgments upon the world, and they will be regarded as the cause of the fearful convulsions of nature and the strife and bloodshed among men that are filling the earth with woe. The power attending the last warning has enraged the wicked; their anger is kindled against all who have received the message, and Satan will excite to still greater intensity the spirit of hatred and persecution. {GC 614.3}

The same argument many centuries ago was brought against Christ by the "rulers of the people." "It is expedient for us," said the wily Caiaphas, "that one man should die for the people, and that the whole nation perish not." John 11:50. This argument will appear conclusive; and a decree will finally be issued against those who hallow the Sabbath of the fourth commandment, denouncing them as deserving of the severest punishment and giving the people liberty, after a certain time, to put them to death. Romanism in the Old World and apostate Protestantism in the New will pursue a similar course toward those who honor all the divine precepts. {GC 615.2}

15. The saints will encounter a time of trouble similar to whose? Jeremiah 30:5-7______

The "time of trouble, such as never was," is soon to open upon us; and we shall need an experience which we do not now possess and which many are too indolent to obtain. It is often the case that trouble is greater in anticipation than in reality; but this is not true of the crisis before us. The most vivid presentation cannot reach the magnitude of the ordeal. In that time of trial, every soul must stand for himself before God. "Though Noah, Daniel, and Job" were in the land, "as I live, saith the Lord God, they shall deliver neither son nor daughter; they shall but deliver their own souls by their righteousness." Ezekiel 14:20. {GC 622.4}

16. What did the Lord tell Jacob? Genesis 31:3

17. What did Jacob encounter before he returned to his home, the earthly promised land? Genesis 32:1-20

As Satan influenced Esau to march against Jacob, so he will stir up the wicked to destroy God's people in the time of trouble. And as he accused Jacob, he will urge his accusations against the people of God. He numbers the world as his subjects; but the little company who keep the commandments of God are resisting his supremacy. If he could blot them from the earth, his triumph would be complete. He sees that holy angels are guarding them, and he infers that their sins have been pardoned; but he does not know that their cases have been decided in the sanctuary above. {GC 618.2}

18. What did Jacob do? Genesis 32:9-11,22-31

As Satan accuses the people of God on account of their sins, the Lord permits him to try them to the uttermost. Their confidence in God, their faith and firmness, will be severely tested. As they review the past, their hopes sink; for in their whole lives they can see little good. They are fully conscious of their weakness and unworthiness. Satan endeavors to terrify them with the thought that their cases are hopeless, that the stain of their defilement will never be washed away. He hopes so to destroy their faith that they will yield to his temptations and turn from their allegiance to God. {GC 618.3}

Though God's people will be surrounded by enemies who are bent upon their destruction, <u>yet the anguish which they suffer is not a dread of persecution for the truth's sake; they fear that every sin has not been repented of, and that through some fault in themselves they will fail to realize the fulfillment of the Saviour's promise: I "will keep thee from the hour of temptation, which shall come upon all the world." Revelation 3:10. If they could have the assurance of pardon they would not shrink from torture or death; but should they prove unworthy, and lose their lives because of their own defects of character, then God's holy name would be reproached. {GC 619.1}</u>

They feel that had they always employed all their ability in the service of Christ, going forward from strength to strength, Satan's forces would have less power to prevail against them. {GC 619.2}

19. The time of trouble in the near future for the righteous will be similar to what Jesus experienced on the cross. Meditate upon the following. Matthew 27:45,46; Luke 23:46

The season of distress and anguish before us will require a faith that can endure weariness, delay, and hunger--a faith that will not faint though severely tried. The period of probation is granted to all to prepare for that time. Jacob prevailed because he was persevering and determined. His victory is an evidence of the power of importunate prayer. All who will lay hold of God's promises, as he did, and be as earnest and persevering as he was, will succeed as he succeeded. Those who are unwilling to deny self, to agonize before God, to pray long and earnestly for His blessing, will not obtain it. Wrestling with God--how few know what it is! How few have ever had their souls drawn out after God with intensity of desire until every power is on the stretch. When waves of despair which no language can express sweep over the suppliant, how few cling with unyielding faith to the promises of God. {GC 621.2}

Those who exercise but little faith now, are in the greatest danger of falling under the power of satanic delusions and the decree to compel the conscience. And even if they endure the test they will be plunged into deeper distress and anguish in the time of trouble, because they have never made it a habit to trust in God. The lessons of faith which they have neglected they will be forced to learn under a terrible pressure of discouragement. {GC 622.1}

Could men see with heavenly vision, they would behold companies of angels that excel in strength stationed about those who have kept the word of Christ's patience. With sympathizing tenderness, angels have witnessed their distress and have heard their prayers. They are waiting the word of their Commander to snatch them from their peril. But they must wait yet a little longer. The people of God must drink of the cup and be baptized with the baptism. The very delay, so painful to them, is the best answer to their petitions. As they endeavor to wait trustingly for the Lord to work they are led to exercise faith, hope, and patience, which have been too little exercised during their religious experience. {GC 630.2}

20. What will happen during the time of trouble, when the plagues are falling? Revelation 16:13,14
Fearful sights of a supernatural character will soon be revealed in the heavens, in token of the power of miracle-working demons.
The spirits of devils will go forth to the kings of the earth and to the whole world, to fasten them in deception, and urge them on to unite with
Satan in his last struggle against the government of heaven. By these agencies, rulers and subjects will be alike deceived. Persons will
arise pretending to be Christ Himself, and claiming the title and worship which belong to the world's Redeemer. They will perform wonderful
miracles of healing and will profess to have revelations from heaven contradicting the testimony of the Scriptures. {GC 624.1} As the crowning act in the great drama of deception, Satan himself will personate Christ. The church has long professed to look to the
Saviour's advent as the consummation of her hopes. Now the great deceiver will make it appear that Christ has come. In different parts of
the earth, Satan will manifest himself among men as a majestic being of dazzling brightness, resembling the description of the Son of God
given by John in the Revelation. Revelation 1:13-15. The glory that surrounds him is unsurpassed by anything that mortal eyes have yet
beheld. The shout of triumph rings out upon the air: "Christ has come! Christ has come!" The people prostrate themselves in adoration
before him, while he lifts up his hands and pronounces a blessing upon them, as Christ blessed His disciples when He was upon the earth.
His voice is soft and subdued, yet full of melody. In gentle, compassionate tones he presents some of the same gracious, heavenly truths
which the Saviour uttered; he heals the diseases of the people, and then, in his assumed character of Christ, he claims to have changed
the Sabbath to Sunday, and commands all to hallow the day which he has blessed. He declares that those who persist in keeping holy the
seventh day are blaspheming his name by refusing to listen to his angels sent to them with light and truth. This is the strong, almost
overmastering delusion. Like the Samaritans who were deceived by Simon Magus, the multitudes, from the least to the greatest, give heed
to these sorceries, saying: This is "the great power of God." Acts 8:10. {GC 624.2}
21. How may we escape this strong delusion of Satan? Matthew 24:24-27,31; Matthew 25:31; Revelation 1:7; 1 Thessalonians 4:16,17
Only those who have been diligent students of the Scriptures and who have received the love of the truth will be shielded from the
powerful delusion that takes the world captive. By the Bible testimony these will detect the deceiver in his disguise. To all the testing time
will come. By the sifting of temptation the genuine Christian will be revealed. Are the people of God now so firmly established upon His
word that they would not yield to the evidence of their senses? Would they, in such a crisis, cling to the Bible and the Bible only?
<u>Satan will, if possible, prevent them from obtaining a preparation to stand in that day.</u> He will so arrange affairs as to hedge up their
way, entangle them with earthly treasures, cause them to carry a heavy, wearisome burden, that their hearts may be overcharged with the
cares of this life and the day of trial may come upon them as a thief. {GC 625.3}
22. What will happen to God's saints during the time of trouble, when the plagues begin to fall? Revelation 16:2-6
Says the revelator, in describing those terrific scourges: "There fell a noisome and grievous sore upon the men which had the
mark of the beast, and upon them which worshiped his image." The sea "became as the blood of a dead man: and every living soul died in
the sea." And "the rivers and fountains of waters became blood." Terrible as these inflictions are, God's justice stands fully vindicated.
The angel of God declares: "Thou art righteous, O Lord, because Thou hast judged thus. For they have shed the blood of saints and
prophets, and Thou hast given them blood to drink; for they are worthy." Revelation 16:2-6. By condemning the people of God to death,
they have as truly incurred the guilt of their blood as if it had been shed by their hands. In like manner Christ declared the Jews of
His time guilty of all the blood of holy men which had been shed since the days of Abel; for they possessed the same spirit and were
